



Who: Steering Committee

Why:

- Concern over hikers walking down Route 9D someone was going to get hurt!
- Concern about overuse of Breakneck Trail (erosion, trail spreading, graffiti, etc.)
- Interest in making 9D safer for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers
- Interest in connecting all the way to Beacon

Goals at the time:

- Provide a safe walking and cycling route from Cold Spring to Beacon
- Improve safety at the Breakneck Station and Trailhead
- Help boost visitation to Cold Spring Main Street so community receives some benefit



So what happened in 2016-2017?



Completed SEQRA Environmental Review under Town of Fishkill Lead Agency (Negative Declaration)

Went to bid via Town of Fishkill – low response rate, high cost

1. Failed bid process

GEIS (SEQRA) Environmental Review Kickoff Workshop

When: 2017

What was completed?

- Consultant hired (AKRF)
- Lead Agency Declared (OPRHP)
- Scoping document prepared (available online)
- Public Workshop Held

What We Heard

- Main Street too crowded, route people away from Main Street
- Fair Street too impacted, conditions unsafe for kids
- Design should be sustainable and restore landscape where possible
- Fjord Trail design should complement the beauty of landscape
- More access to river!

Who: Steering Committee


Why:

- More hikers than ever before more impacts, local frustration
- Need for more management infrastructure to protect quality of life and environment
- Desire to offer benefit for residents (social, recreational, educational)

Evolving goals:

- Provide a safe *accessible* walking and cycling route from Cold Spring to Beacon
- Improve safety at the Breakneck Station and Trailhead
- Help MANAGE visitation to Cold Spring <u>and</u> 9D corridor and Hudson Highlands State Park Preserve

Create some destinations north to keep pressure off Village and spread people out








It's still intended for bikes and pedestrians






THE FJORD TRAIL: MASTER PLAN



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The Nimham Trail

- Completed July 2021
- A rugged meander that creates a safe and pleasant way to access viewsheds along Breakneck Ridge
- Creates a rational loop for hikers using the Breakneck scramble to ascend
- Fewer hikers bushwhacking down the ridge
- Breakneck now one-way




Improvements Made



Early Safety Improvements: Breakneck Station

- Completed in March 2022
- A partnership project between HHFT and Metro-North Railroad
- New access pathway to/from station
- Fencing between tracks and trail pathway
- Wayfinding signage



Improvements Made



Draft Master Plan in Environmental Review

SEQRA Underway on updated master plan

State Parks still Lead Agency

Breakneck Connector still going ahead – Independent Utility

Draft GEIS with site specific EIS on shoreline trail will be out for public review in a few months

- 30 day minimum time for public review followed by a public hearing
- Village is on the Interested and Involved list





Breakneck Connector Moving Forward



Target Dates:

Fall/Winter 2022: Breakneck Connector -- Upper Overlook Construction Begins

Early 2023: Breakneck Connector & Bridge Construction Begins (trailhead is closed until completion)

Dutchess Manor renovation begins

Early 2025: HHFT Breakneck Connector & Bridge and HHFT Visitor Center at

Dutchess Manor are completed and open to the public

Full shuttle service begins

Anticipated

2024: Shoreline Trail construction start, Little Stony Point and Dockside Park enhancements
















